

## Because culture in its broadest sense is what distinguishes one place from another.

# Why are we thinking about the place names now?

Because names, even if they are 'working titles', help to define the characteristics of a place and its relationship to its surroundings... ... and because if the planning application is approved this exploration could underpin the approach to further naming.

The Lovelace Neighbourhood Plan (2020) states:







A History of Ockham to 1900 Lachelin & Primrose:

# Stratford Oak

Stratford Hyde: The name 'Stratford' is already synonymous with the western side of the site.

References the former farms in this locality and roots it in the history of the land.

Dallas-Pierce-Quintero

'Upper Ockham' indicates being 'above' or 'north' of the historic 'centre' of Ockham.

Routes into the central neighbourhood will give a sense of moving to higher land. Local residents recognised the location is on higher ground

Upper Ockham was the strong preference from all at the workshop.

Ockham Rise - offers a similar indication of moving to higher ground

Other names that were considered


### Ockham on the Hill No clear visible sense of 'a hill' location Local residents don't consider the area to be a hill

Middle Ockham

This name was rejected as the historic centre near the church is considered the heart of Ockham.

Ockham Ridge Technically the site sits on a ridge, however this wasn't felt to be of key importance in naming. Neighbourhood Naming

## Beacon End

East Neighbourhood

'End' refers to the neighbourhood being on the end of the site. References other names - Bridge End, Church End and Hatchford End.

Upton End: Upton Farm is a Grade II listed Farm building located to the south-east corner of the site.

Beacon End:


References Ockham Beacon, the navigational aid for aircraft found in this area of the site (in the process of being decommissioned). Other names that were considered

Upton Green Each neighbourhood has a Green - better retained to name the 'village green' itself.

Ockham Beacon It was felt that Upper Ockham should uniquely retain the Ockham name amongst the three new settlements.

> Eastfield / East Field Considered too generic

Names could be inspired by RHS Wisley and the landscape of the site and wider area.



### Example themes - Central Neighbourhood

Roads, green spaces and landmarks:

Names inspired by the rich local history including pioneers from the area.







### Example themes - East Neighbourhood

Roads, green spaces and landmarks:

Names could be inspired by the site's rural location.
